Pastoral Thoughts

We, as Orthodox Christians, are being presented with a golden opportunity right now, Great Lent. Our engagement with the Church ramps up considerably, and our opportunity to draw nearer to Christ is there for the taking.

Starting in mid-March, we have the option to worship much more often than usual. We start the five-week cycle of the Salutations service on Fridays. Coming at this service from the outside as we did over 30 years ago, we found a gem of hymnology we had never imagined. It is an intimate gathering expressing our love and affection for the Lord's mother, the Theotokos.

Wednesday evenings we have the Presanctified Liturgy. It is a solemn experience we don't have all that often. There is a strong devotional quality to this service, as well as the eucharist. The first time one experiences this service it is a revelation.

Sundays, between now and Holy Week, all have important themes, chances to learn about important saints and events in Church history. We mark the return of the Icons, St. Gregory Palamas, and St. Mary of Egypt, among others. Special hymns mark these celebrations, as well as processions, all different than the norm, all designed in the Church's wisdom to draw us to Holy Week.

As does a great movie or novel, the excitement and intensity build through Lent toward Holy week. This year, we will have services of various types 16 times in nine days, from Lazarus Saturday through Bright Monday when we will have liturgy for St. George. Those who participate reach Pascha prepared for the emotional release as we shout, 'Christ is Risen'!

Work, school, and other realities may limit our participation, but we should strive, within those limitations, to gather as a community to worship, to contemplate, to sing, to pray, to receive the Body and Blood, and to prepare ourselves for that tremendous moment that we celebrate the resurrection. It is worth the effort on so many different levels.

I urge, you, come worship together as a loving family, a community of the faithful, with a focus on Him who rose from the dead and the inexpressible joy and relief of that moment.

LIVES OF THE SAINTS

Sunday of the Holy Cross (April 7)

With the help of God, we have almost reached the middle of the course of the Fast, where our strength has been worn down through abstinence, and the full difficulty of the labour set before us becomes apparent. Therefore our holy Mother, the Church of Christ, now brings to our help the all-holy Cross, the joy of the world, the strength of the faithful, the staff of the just, and the hope of sinners, so that by venerating it reverently, we might receive strength and grace to complete the divine struggle of the Fast.

4th Sunday of Lent (April 14)

The memory of this Saint is celebrated on March 30, where his biography may be found. He is celebrated today because his book, The Ladder of Divine Ascent, is a sure guide to the ascetic life, written by a great man of prayer experienced in all forms of the monastic polity; it teaches the seeker after salvation how to lay a sound foundation for his struggles, how to detect and war against each of the passions, how to avoid the snares laid by the demons, and how to rise from the rudimental virtues to the heights of Godlike <mark>wildness of the nations, and their subjection thereafter to the</mark> love and humility. It is held in such high esteem that it is universally read in its entirety in monasteries during the Great Fast.

5th Sunday of Lent (April 21)

The memory of this Saint is celebrated on April 1, where her life is recorded. Since the end of the holy Forty Days is drawing nigh, it has been appointed for this day also, so that if we think it hard to practice a little abstinence forty days, we might be roused by the heroism of her who fasted in the wilderness forty-seven years; and also that the great loving-kindness of God, and His readiness to receive the repentant, might be demonstrated in very deed.

And he that had been dead four days came forth Today we bring to mind the parable of the ten virgins immediately, bound hand and foot with the grave clothes, and Jesus said to those standing there, "Loose him, and let him go." This is the supernatural wonder wrought by the Saviour that we celebrate on this day.






