Pastoral Thoughts

As created beings we are stuck in time. We have a past, a present and a future, and in no normal way are we allowed to undo the past or see the future. It is suited to our limitations; we have no inkling what chaos we would bring, if we could only go back and change some moment in our past.

We should also be leery of wanting to see or know the future. Would we be able to face the inevitable losses and heartache if we saw them before their time? What dread we would feel, to know when a parent will pass, or the hard times that inevitably come in some way or another.

We believe that God does not live in that sequential time as we do. He sees it all, which is not the same as causing it. It may be well with us to not dwell on that too much.

It is important that the birth of the Savior happened at a specific time and place, when Augustus was Caesar and Quirinius was governor of Syria, in the city of David, Bethlehem. That isn't an origin myth buried in the mists of legend, or in some mystical realm.

But what happened there didn't end there. Christ taking on humanity is an action initiated in time, and yet present. It didn't end.

Listen to the hymns of our church at this precious time: 'Christ is born, glorify Him!' start the katavasias of the Nativity. 'Christ is come from heaven! Go and meet Him!'. Now the action is taking place. We don't find our hearts full over mere historical facts, nor pleasant or moving myths. We reach out with joy to Christ who is here now, before us, drawing us to Him and to His work.

The Kontakion for the season expresses the same reality. 'On this day the Virgin maid goes to the grotto to give birth' an act immediate and compelling. The open heart is compelled to awe and worship. It makes the actions firmly planted in history, in our past in one sense, compelling drama now.

Because of this event, of the Incarnation and Nativity, and the years that followed, we can trouble ourselves less about the future. The Christ who came in time is coming back. His will is for all things good. The troubles, and grief we have and will have will come to an end, and that end will be seen to be as it should.

Christ is born, and nothing will ever be the same. Christ came among us, and we can never be the same. Christ is among us, for our salvation and to bring us home. With that knowledge, and the comfort of the Body of Christ, our brothers and sisters in Christ, we can look past the hard times to glorious eternity with Him.

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LIVES OF THE SAINTS

The Nativity according to the Flesh of our Lord and God and Savior Jesus Christ (December 25)

The incomprehensible and inexplicable Nativity of Christ came to pass when Herod the Great was reigning in Judea; the latter was an Ascalonite on his fathers's side and an Idumean on his mother's. He was in every way foreign to the royal line of David; instead, he had received his authority from the Roman emperors and had ruled tyrannically over the Jewish people for some thirty-three years. The tribe of Judah, which had reigned of old, was deprived of its rights and stripped of all rule and authority. Such was the condition of the Jews when the awaited Messiah was born. It truly thus was fulfilled the prophecy which the Patriarch Jacob had spoken 1,807 years before: "A ruler shall not fail from Judah, nor a prince from his loins, until there come the things stored up for him; and he is the expectation of the nations" (Gen.49:10).

Thus, our Saviour was born in Bethlehem, a city of Judea, whither Joseph had come from Nazareth of Galilee, taking Mary his betrothed, who was great with child, that, according to the decree issued in those days by the Emperor Augustus, they might be registered in the census of those subject to Rome. Therefore, when the time came for the Virgin to give birth, and because of the great multitude, there was no place in the inn, the Virgin's circumstances constrained them to enter a cave which was near Bethlehem. Having as a shelter a stable of irrational beasts, she gave birth there, and swaddled the Infant and laid Him in the manger (Luke 2:1-7). From this, the tradition has come down to us that when Christ was born He lay between two animals, an ox and an ass, that the words of the Prophets might be fulfilled: "Between two living creatures shalt Thou be known" (Abbacum 3:2), and "The ox knoweth his owner and the ass his master's crib" (Esaias 1: 3). But while the earth gave the newborn Saviour such a humble reception, Heaven on high celebrated majestically His world-saving coming. A wondrous star, shining with uncommon brightness and following a strange course, led Magi from the East to Bethlehem to worship the newborn King. Certain shepherds who were in the area of Bethlehem, who kept watch while tending their sheep, were suddenly surrounded by an extraordinary light, and they saw before them an Angel who proclaimed to them the good tidings of the Lord's And straightway, together with this Angel, they joyous Nativity. beheld and heard a whole host of the Heavenly Powers praising God and saying: "Glory to God in the highest, and on earth peace, goodwill towards men" (Luke 2:8-14).

Stephen, Archdeacon & First Marty:

Saint Stephen was a Jew by race and, as some say, a disciple of Gamaliel, the teacher of the Law mentioned in Acts 5:34 and 22:3. He was the first of the seven deacons whom the Apostles established in Jerusalem to care for the poor and distribute alms. Being a man full of faith and of the Holy Spirit, he performed great signs and wonders among the people. While disputing with the Jews concerning Jesus, and wisely refuting their every contradiction, so that no one was able to withstand the wisdom and the spirit whereby he spoke, he was slandered as a blasphemer and was dragged off to the Sanhedrin of the elders. There, with boldness, he proved from the divine Scriptures the coming of the Just One (Jesus), of Whom they had become the betrayers and murderers, and he reproved their faithless and hardheartedness. And finally, gazing into Heaven and beholding the divine glory, he said: "Lo, I see the Heavens opened and the Son of man standing at the right hand of God." But when they heard this, they stopped up their ears, and with anger cast him out of the city and stoned him, while he was calling out and saying, "Lord Jesus, receive my spirit." Then, imitating the longsuffering of the Master, he bent his knees and prayed in a loud voice for those who were stoning him, and he said, "Lord, lay not this sin to their charge," And saying this, he fell asleep (Acts 6, 7), thus becoming the first among the Martyrs of the Church of Christ.
